MAKING A DIFFERENCE WITH MATCHING GRANTS: DAVID'S STORY

ACB-Ohio's Matching Grants program has two purposes, it supports individuals who purchase adaptive equipment and chapters that need financial support for projects. Each individual or chapter can receive up to \$1,000. The individual or chapter is then responsible for securing the remainder of the cost. This program is available to any blind or visually impaired resident of Ohio and any of ACB-Ohio's chapters. To qualify, interested individuals or chapters must complete an application and provide a few required documents. Incomplete applications will not be considered. In 2023, ACBO awarded 11 grants to 10 individuals and one chapter for a total of \$8,103. As of July 2024, ACBO has awarded \$4,278 to eight individuals.

Meet one of our grant recipients, David Green. He joined the Greater Cleveland Chapter in 2023 after experiencing vision loss. David and his 9-year-old son, Jordan, regularly attend chapter events and meetings. David spent his

career as a professional chef, and Jordan readily reports that his dad still makes the best mac and cheese in town!

David heard about the program when Brant Adams, the matching grants committee chair, spoke at the March Cleveland chapter meeting. He reached out to the ACBO office to get his application filled out. He was approved and now is the proud owner of a new talking watch.

David uses the watch and its alarm features throughout his day for tasks such as getting Jordan to and from school, being on time for paratransit, and keeping track of time when he is out and about. "I feel safer," he explained, "I no longer have to ask others 'Excuse me, do you have the time?'" He emphasizes that the watch is easy to use and has increased his independence. "I know that it does not seem like much,

but since I am on a fixed income, the [Matching Grants] program allowed me to get the watch faster. I am very grateful and hope others will use the program."

ACBO is pleased to help David and others. Stay tuned to future issues of this newsletter where we will highlight the Matching Grants program. CLEAR CREEK PARK: Sunday, following check-out from the hotel, we travel a short distance to Clear Creek Park for a gentle hike and relaxing with friends. The park is situated on a beautiful 11-acre wooded wetland on the edge of the city, and offers inner and outer loop trails with gentle grade changes over paved or boardwalk surface covering three fourths of a mile. There is a newly constructed pavilion, accessible restrooms, and a dog relief area. The trail includes an observation deck with benches overlooking Clear Creek.

Some of my educational and career interests at the moment are to finish my Bachelor of Science Degree in Chemistry with an ACS Certification. Afterward, I plan to stay at WSU and be a part of their master's and Doctoral Programs. With this, I hope to gain field experience with internships and become a graduate teaching assistant. Once I complete my educational pathway, I hope to find a position in a laboratory doing research or becoming a professor of chemistry. My area of interest currently is organic chemistry, due to the fact I found an interest in it while in the class. Yet, I do not want to limit myself to a specialization until I finish my undergraduate program, since there might be other areas of chemistry that suit me better for a career.

Other future goals of mine are to move to a place off campus and start a family after my educational pathway. I want to be financially stable and have a stable career before this. I have also thought about relocating to a place where there would be better opportunities for positions in my field depending on what I decide to specialize in.

This scholarship benefits me because it will help me financially get through my undergraduate program and focus on my academic studies to help me be qualified for positions in my field. Due to being visually impaired, it is hard to attend college full time while taking upper-level STEM courses and working at the same time. This is difficult since I have Aniridia and it takes me two to three times longer than the average student to complete assignments. With this scholarship, I can focus on my academies and not worry about how I am going to financially cover my academics.

LIBRARY NEWS

- After much consideration and mixed emotions, Tracy Grimm, manager of the braille and talking book programs at the State Library of Ohio, has decided to retire after 33 years of service. NATURE FOR ALL: CREATING A SENSORY TRAIL AT HOGBACK RIDGE PARK

Casey Smith, outdoor connections manager for Preservation Parks of Delaware County, reached out to ACBO in February. She sought our input for a proposed sensory trail to benefit hikers who are blind or have low vision. She joined the sports and rec committee in March to talk about the project.

"For our park district, one of our goals is to provide 'wow' experiences. We're trying to find communities that are underserved and things that no one else in central Ohio has and we can provide," Casey said.

The Delaware Board of Developmental Disabilities reached out to Hogback Ridge to create the trail and

provided a \$20,000 grant for trail modifications and construction of accessible, single-family restroom with an adult changing table. Hogback Ridge is home to Preservation Parks' district offices, nature center, a small conference room, and restrooms (currently, only a port-a-john is available on evenings and weekends when the nature center is closed). This location was chosen from the district's 12 parks in part for its unique topography—a ridge between two deep ravines. The project is slated for completion this year.

Casey, along with park planner Zach Messinger, researched existing sensory trails and strategies for making natural habitats accessible. They read articles, talked with other park planners, talked to service providers (for example, O & M instructors), and members of the blind community. They traveled to northeast Ohio this spring to tour the Highbrook Lodge ropes trail for practical ideas.

"What we found out really quickly is that finding where trails were was really challenging. It seems like it would be very, very difficult if you wanted to go visit a trail but you didn't know what was accessible," Zach said. "We want people to feel very capable of what they're doing."

Members of the ACBO sports and recreation committee, along with members of the Sunbury Lions Club, took part in a hike and discussion in May. The focus group walked the three-fourths mile gravel loop, discussing solutions for independent exploration. The design will focus on a self-guided nature hike.

"We want to incorporate signage as you go through that pauses you at different trees. There are a number of different trees that have really distinct bark. The shagbark hickory is going to feel totally different than the oak tree over there," Zach explained.

A bronze relief map of the area will be available at the trail head. Braille signage, tactile markers, and set areas inviting hikers to touch trees and wildflowers are some of the proposed modifications. Website design, use of audible narratives, mapping apps, and other ideas to support blind visitors were discussed following the hike.

Many thanks to Casey and Zach for a wonderful day spent in nature, good conversation, and the opportunity to share ideas on this important project. We are all looking forward to opening day in the near future.




